Space Place at Carter Observatory, Wellington, NZ



The **2016 Australasian Planetarium Society Meeting** will take place on 4-5 April at Space Place at Carter Observatory, located in the middle of the beautiful Wellington Botanic Gardens. The conference will provide an excellent opportunity to network with planetarium professionals from both fixed and mobile domes across the Australasian region. Sky-Skan completed a major planetarium upgrade in February 2015 and we are looking forward to showing off our new system.

We are fortunate to be able to spend the majority of our time in the dome this year and invite all institutions and vendors to submit presentations they would like to deliver during the meeting. We have recently completed our first full length "in-house" show and plan to include a session to demonstrate this and other content made by APS members. We will also have slots available for more traditional style short talks, as well as longer presentations.

The planetarium demonstrations are open to members and non-members. The sessions are included for all members. Non-members may attend at the rate of NZ\$60 (one day) or NZ\$100 (both days). Morning and afternoon teas and lunches will be provided for all attendees. The **APS Dinner** on Monday night is free to non-commercial members thanks to sponsorship by Sky-Skan, partners are also welcome at additional cost. Breakfasts and Sunday night dinner are at your own expense.

The **AGM** will take place on Monday 4th April. Please note that only financial APS members will be entitled to vote at the AGM. All members will receive renewal notices prior to the conference. *Non-members may attend and speak to the meeting only at the discretion of the APS executive.*

Navigation by the Stars - Reuben Raihania Tipoki

6pm, Space Place at Carter Observatory

On Sunday evening we welcome Reuben Raihania Tipoki (Ngati Kahungunu, Ngati Ruapani, Rongowhakaata, Te Aitanga a Mahaki, Te Hika a Papauma, Moriori)

Reuben started sailing in 2010 and has since sailed over 40,000 miles throughout the Pacific, including 12,000 as captain. He Captained Okeanos through Micronesia for 7 months for the pilot of the "Sustainable Sea Transport" project now operating in Vanuatu and the Cook Islands.

In this fascinating presentation Reuben will give context to traditional celestial navigation by talking about how nature guided our tipuna, with Ranginui (the Sky Father) being one part of a complex 'map' which allowed the people of the pacific to venture beyond the horizon over 4 thousand years ago. He'll introduce us to the stars our ancestors used and how they used them, and share some of his own amazing experiences along the way.

Just a millimetre away from you there could be another universe, but you can't see it or touch it. The only way to get there is to travel in a direction that is forbidden. SPACE PLACE AT CARTER OBSERVATORY

Space Place is housed in Carter Observatory, New Zealand's longest-serving national observatory. The Observatory is named after Charles Rooking Carter, an English immigrant who gifted £2,240 from his estate to the Royal Society of New Zealand. It was his wish that the money be used to establish an astronomical observatory in Wellington for the benefit of the people of New Zealand.

Parliament established Carter Observatory in 1937 and it opened its doors in 1941. Carter became a base for astronomical research in New Zealand. Work began with solar investigations and when new staff joined during the 1970s, it expanded to include variable stars, galaxies and asteroids. Carter Observatory became New Zealand's National Observatory in 1977. In 2005, a government report recommended that Carter Observatory be transformed into a world-class visitor attraction, paving the way for Space Place.

Planetarium

The theatre features a 9m dome and up to 65 unidirectional seats. The full dome system was upgraded by Sky-Skan in February 2015 and features 6 JVC DLA-VS2200 projectors.

We also have the unique ability to remove all seats from the planetarium, allowing us to hold dinners and events under the stars.



Getting There

Space Place is located in the beautiful Wellington Botanic Gardens just a short stroll from the top of the cable car. Our physical address is 40 Salamanca Road, Kelburn, 6012.

On foot/public transport

Nowhere is very far in Wellington but it is quite an uphill walk to get to the observatory on foot from the city, so the easiest way to reach us is via the Cable Car from Lambton Quay. There are numerous buses that travel along Lambton Quay from all over the city. Alternatively buses numbers 18, 20, 22, 23 and 47 stop on Upland road, just a short walk from the Observatory.

Wellington station is around 10 minutes walk from the Cable Car terminal.
